### Crossing Borders Social, Cultural and Clinical Challenges

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One of the most important challenges today is to think about how to respond to the mass exodus of people crossing borders to escape war, poverty and the effects of globalisation. This Symposium is an opportunity to think about the changes we need to make to our cultural, social and clinical understanding within the context of this international crisis.

The Symposium will take place in the centre of Berlin, which has become, since the fall of the Berlin Wall, a lively and creative city. It attracts young people from all over the world and has a strongly multicultural city population interested in art, culture and history. It is a city filled with a difficult past and a promising future.

Berlin has a long historical tradition with migrants and, for example in the 17th century, one in five residents were French Huguenots.

In the past Berlin was part of the Christian and Jewish cultural centre of Europe together with Krakow, Prague, Vienna and Lemberg. Berlin was the capital of Germany during the National Socialist dictatorship. It was a divided city during the Cold War but today, Berlin is now the capital of a reunited Germany. All these phases of history are mirrored in the very varied architecture of the city.

We look forward to welcoming a wide range of people to the Symposium. Colleagues from the former Eastern Europe, those involved in the crisis of the Eurozone and those involved with the vast numbers of refugees crossing borders at this time in our history. We hope that the Symposium will be a challenge for all grappling with these issues, whether group analysts or not. Whatever your participation, the Symposium will be enriched by your contributions to the academic and experiential program.

English will be the official language. We will try to facilitate communication and comprehension for speakers of other languages.

### Day 2 Inclusion and Exclusion – We and the Other

One of the human basic needs is to belong. This is the basis of setting up groups but also the basis of exclusion. There is no inclusion without exclusion.

On our final day we will look at the different approaches to Group Analysis and cross the borders of our inherited ideas with those we are developing today.

But before borders can be crossed, they have to be established. Before differences can be negotiated, they have to be fixed. How is this decided? Who decides? What are the consequences for our group analytic community?

### Professor Aleida Assmann

Professor of Literary and Cultural Studies at the University of Konstanz.

Her specific interests cluster around the History of German Memory since 1945 and the Theories of Memory.

She has been working on a research project entitled "The Past in the Present: Dimensions and Dynamics of Cultural Memory."

### **Professor Seyla Benhabib**

She is a Turkish-American Philosopher, Professor of Political Science and Philosophy at Yale University, and Director of the program in Ethics, Politics and Economics.

Benhabib prefers a world without porous borders. She argues that political boundaries define some as members, but inevitably lock others out.

She has written: "I think it is possible to have an empire without borders; I don't think it is possible to have a democracy without borders."

### **Professor Elisabeth Rohr**

Professor for Intercultural Education at the University of Marburg and a Group Analyst. Her scientific focus is on migration and she has worked extensively in Guatemala and Palestine.

### Mr. Dick Blackwell

He is a Consultant Group and Family Psychotherapist at the Baobab Centre in London for young survivors in exile and has worked clinically, for many years, with asylum seekers and people who have been tortured

### Dr. Catherine Gransard

She has a Doctorate in Psychology and works at the Centre Georges Devereux, in the field of Ethnopsychiatry with families. These are families who have had to leave their country are living between two countries, between two cultures and often between two religions as well.

### Ms Hanni Biran

She is a Group Analyst at the Israeli Institute of Group Analysis. She will address in her clinical lecture a topic related to the theme of the Symposium.

### Dr. Farhad Dalal

Is a Training Group Analyst who works in Exeter and Totnes, Devon. He is also visiting Professor at the PHD School, Open University of Holland.

Dr. Dalal has been developing group analytic theory for many years and will draw on themes from his last book: "Thought Paralysis: The Virtues of discrimination."
